# WELLINGTON PUBLIC LIBRARY: A RICH HISTORY

In 1884-85 when the town of Wellington was twelve years old, the first small lending library was opened by an attorney named William Black. From there, the library moved several times until the formation of The Prentis Club in 1898.

The Prentis Club was named for Mrs. Caroline Prentis of Topeka. In 1899, Mrs. Prentis visited the club and, among other civic projects, suggested the ladies establish a library for Wellington.

The Club hosted fundraisers and collected donations of books and furniture. It was housed in several locations through the years. When the new Wellington City Hall was being built at the northwest corner of Washington and 7<sup>th</sup> Street, the club women were promised two rooms on the second floor; one was to be used for the library.

# WPL: A RICH HISTORY (cont.)



As the library continued to grow it was also outgrowing the Prentis Club member's ability to oversee it, The Wellington Library Association was set up. In March 1908, the library was incorporated under state law relating to public libraries.

In May 1914, the Wellington City Library board held its first meeting and voted to begin the process of erecting a library building. The following year funds were received from the Carnegie Corporation and construction began. The library was opened to the public in 1916.

In 1986, the Library Board of Trustees and community became involved in a project to enlarge and renew the original structure; June 6, 1987 the Wellington Carnegie Library was entered on the National Register of Historic Places. The interior of the library maintains its original open floor plan and vestibule en-

trance. The first floor pillars retain their marble wainscoting.






